




The College honored a record 200 spring graduates at its 77th Commencement Exercises held last May 17, 2023, at the FSM-China Friendship Sports Center, in Palikir, Pohnpei.

According to the college's Registrar, "This is the greatest number of spring graduates in the college history since 2018. The number surpasses by 18% the 169 COM-FSM graduates in the spring 2022 commencement. This spring 2023, we have 118 graduates at the National Campus, 38 at the Career & Technical Education Center, 17 at Chuuk Campus, 19 at Yap Campus, and eight at Kosrae Campus.'

The college's Registrar also reported that the college's FSM Fisheries & Maritime Institute (FSM-FMI) in Yap graduated 21 cadets and conferred them certificates of achievement in Navigation and Marine Engineering.

THE PERSONNEL AUDIT

The Request for Proposals for the Personnel Audit closed on May 24, 2023. The college received three proposals. The Review Committee for evaluating the applications is made up of the Human Resources Director, the 5 Vice Presidents and the Comptroller. The final recommendations for selecting the consultant(s) will be sent to the President by June 26, 2023. The Personnel Audit is scheduled to start by September 1, 2023.

STRATEGIC PLANNING AT COM-FSM

THE TEAM-BUILDING AND SWOT ANALYSIS PHASES IS UNDERWAY; SLT IS COMPLETE AND VPs ARE WORKING WITH THEIR TEAMS NOW.

The Senior Leadership Team (SLT) SWOT Analysis sessions were conducted on April 18 (via zoom from the Chuuk campus) and May 18 (at the National campus). Refer to Appendix 2 for the power point presentation. The Vice Presidents have started rolling out their SWOT analyses sessions with their direct reports and teams. These sessions should be completed by August 31, 2023. The final draft of the Strategic Plan 2024-2029 is scheduled to be completed by October 31, 2023.

In the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) sitevisit team's report, 2 recommendations to improve quality were included. **Recommendation 1** is provided as follows:

• To increase effectiveness the team recommends that the College strengthen the integration of short- and long-term plans for the allocation of human, physical, technological, and financial resources to meet student needs in the post-pandemic environment (I.B.9).

Integrated planning at COM-FSM is represented in Figure 1.

Recommendation 2 is provided as follows:

• To increase effectiveness the team recommends that the College strengthen its practices and systems of personnel evaluation and management as stated in the President's Work plan (III.A.3, III.A.5).

As part of the Personnel Audit, new performance management and evaluation system will be also developed based on accountability and evidence-based performance. Increments will be reviewed on the basis of an awards system for performing beyond expectations.

While the college's regular summer 2023 session is scheduled from May 29 to July 13, 2023, a special summer 2023 session for incoming new (or first-time-incollege) students will be scheduled on July 3 to 28, 2023, to accommodate seniors from Pohnpei, Kosrae, Chuuk, and Yap who will be graduated from high schools during the first and second quarters of June. Registration for this special summer session will be on June 26 to 30, 2023.

According to the college's registrar, "This special summer 2023 session will provide new and first-time-in-college freshman students a head start and get off to a strong start. It will enable them to take development English and Math courses, a buffer of credit, and will help set them up to reach graduation on timely manner. Regular registration for this special summer 2023 session will be on June 26 to June 30, 2023."

In June 2021, the Regional Educational Laboratory Pacific at McREL International published its study in collaboration with the college entitled Using High School Data to Explore Early College Success on Pohnpei, Federated States of Micronesia. The study examined the early college success of students who graduated from public high schools on Pohnpei in the Federated States of Micronesia and enrolled at COM-FSM between 2016 and 2018. One of the findings in this study relating to the COM-FSM Entrance Test (COMET) provides that:

'First enrolling in the summer term than in the fall term after high school graduation was positively associated with the College of Micronesia-FSM students' persistence to a second year. The probability of persisting to a second year was 83% for students who enrolled for the first time in the summer term and 60% for students who enrolled for the first time in the

CFE GREENHOUSES **OPENING** DATES

Pohnpei Greenhouse Yield: April 2021-2022

Pohnpei Greenhouse can yield 342 crops per week, while each state greenhouse can yield 200. A new crop has been tested which doubled the yield. Each greenhouse is now expected to produce double what CFE initially had. As for total yield, below chart summarizes the harvest since CFE started delivering to the dining hall.

CFE did the inauguration of its greenhouse on Pohnpei (National Campus) in November 2022 even though some of the greenhouses have been operating since 2021. CFE spent the year 2021 testing produce and training the agricultural technicians on farm management. It is also important to note that CFE already had smaller greenhouses since 2019 from a grant under the US Department of Interior before it upgraded its farm to the larger greenhouses through the US Economic Development Administration.

According to the CFE Executive Director, "From April 1, 2023, to May 31, 2023, the Center's greenhouses at Chuuk and Kosrae produced 1,000 and 560 heads of Oakleaf lettuce, respectively; while the greenhouse at Yap produced 200 heads of Oakleaf lettuce during the month of May 2023."











SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATION GRANT (SEG) WORK-STUDY **PROGRAM**

The FAO's SEG Work-Study Coordinator reported that 374 students enrolled in the SEG Work-Study Program last spring 2023, and received \$169,097.50 of financial assistance.



3016 defines good academic standing as "having a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 or above." Cumulative GPA is the average for all semesters attended at the college.





CONNECTING MINORITY COMMUNITIES (CMC) GRANT



Communication was received from the Telecommunications Regulation Authority (TRA) through the FSM National Government's Department of Transportation, Communications





MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES

NFROAC 2023

2023 National Extension and Research Administrative Officers Conference (NERAOC 2023) was recently concluded in Nashville, TN. Four staff members attended this conference, including the VPCRE, Comptroller, Researcher from Yap Campus, and CTEC-CRE Coordinator. The conference was held from April 30 to May 3, 2023, in Nashville, TN. It was attended by over 600 extension and research administrative officers from various land-grant institutions, including insular areas and government agencies nationwide.



The conference provided a venue for professional development, information sharing, and networking with the U.S. Department of Agriculture National Institute of Food and Agriculture and state Cooperative Extension and land grant institutions.

NERAOC's mission is to serve members by advancing the fields of fiscal, grant (competitive and capacity), administrative, communications and marketing, and human resources management through professional development, the sharing of knowledge, and by promoting diversity and collaboration among federal and state, and international partners to include 1862, 1890, and 1994 land grant institutions.

This year's NERAOC theme, "Hitting the High Notes," highlighted the community of National Extension and Research Administers and Officers, the community of land-grant institutions, the community of the partnership with USDA-NIFA, and all other communities.

The 2023 NERAOC featured over 50 sessions covering a range of topic under six broad categories:

- 1. Diversity and Inclusion
- Finance/Capacity Funding
- 3. Grants Management
- 4. HR/Organizational Development
- Minority-Serving
- Program Reporting & Accountability

These sessions were designed to provide attendees with practical tools and strategies for managing their programs effectively and enhancing their impact. A special breakfast session provided a platform for sharing programs targeted to land-grant institutions in the Insular Areas.

Key Takeaways: The conference provided several key takeaways for extension and research administrators, as follows:

- 1. There is a growing need for more effective and efficient research management and program evaluation strategies to maximize impact and ensure accountability.
- The emergence of a new reporting platform presents challenges and opportunities for research projects and extension programs' reporting targeting outcomes and impacts to measure success.
- 3. Building strong partnerships and collaborations with stakeholders is essential for success in today's research and extension landscape. The conference strengthened professional development and information sharing through engaging presentations, hands-on sessions, and roundtable discussions, including networking with colleagues nationwide.







RESEARCH & EXTENSION:

KOSRAE: YOUTH AND FAMILY ISSUES IN THE COMMUNITIES

WEAVING PROGRAM

Youths and senior adults were the target audience for the weaving training program. CRE staff taught participants how to select and prepare local materials for making local handicrafts. All participants were able to complete the preparation process and completed three new products at the end of the two-month program. The participants were very serious and worked together helping each other to complete their planned products. A total of 101 participants successfully attended and completed the program.

SEWING PROGRAM

Through a collaborative effort, the Extension Assistant assisted in successfully securing additional funding from CFSM for this program. A total of \$50,000.00 was granted and awarded to Kosrae Women Association. Sewing is one of the activities of high interest and need for financial assistance. The fund was used for the purchase of sewing materials and the

training focused on school uniforms. The purpose of the sewing training is for mothers to learn how to sew school uniforms for their kids. Extension staff helped design the pattern with a logo and displayed it to members of the association. A total of 38 participants attended the meeting and supported the idea of school uniforms. CRE staff also presented to a Parents Teachers Association (PTA) meeting. There is support from parents and teachers for school uniforms.



POHNPEI

ENHANCING LOCAL CROP PRODUCTION The following training and technical assistance were provided:

- ▶ Seven training sessions and four hands-on demonstrations on vegetable gardening were conducted.
- ▶ 54 clients (9 youths, 41 new adult clients, and 4 program clients) have received technical assistance on various techniques for vegetable gardening, from germinating seeds to harvesting produce. This includes specific trainings on compost-making and demonstrating their use in growing crops and vegetables.
- ▶ Follow-ups (4) were carried out to monitor program results indicating that two farmers have increased the size of their farm with an estimate of 10 sq. feet to 50 sq. feet. One client was successful in earning extra income from the sale of cucumbers and reporting earnings of about \$900.





IMPROVED SWINE PRODUCTION

The ongoing program provides technical assistance in efforts to improve local breeds of pigs using artificial insemination and basic health treatments. Dry-litter system for pig waste management and compost application is also being promoted in the communities.



A total of twenty-five activities covered the following topics: artificial insemination, swine treatment and castration demonstration, disease and estrus checkups, and follow-ups were conducted for nineteen clients. (2 youths, 17adults, 16 new clients, 3 program clients) received hands-on demonstrations on swine treatment. The first dispatch of artificial insemination (AI) started in the month of April for eight swine farmers. The program aims to increase the local production and availability of pork to the local market as well as for customary uses (funerals and social gatherings).

YOUTH PROGRAM

Activities target youth groups in the communities and at the elementary school (19 elementary schools). Targeting 6 and 8 graders on vegetable gardening in order for them to have a healthy life in the future




Figure 1. Availability of full-time and part-time instructors from spring 2023 to fall 2023




Figure 2. Summer 2023: Number of course sections offered system-wide through face-toface (residential) and online deliver

targeting 6 and 8 graders on vegetable gardening in order for them to have a healthy life in the future. The following activities were carried out during this reporting period:

- Mentoring sessions were conducted for AFT students (8) focusing on financial management skills.
- ▶ Hands-on demonstrations and lectures on gardening with schools and within the communities
- 15 households received training in vegetable gardening, and 11 households were able to make \$150/month.
- ▶ St. Barnabas Youth started a volleyball league for 252 boys and girls to promote good sportsmanship and promote healthy lifestyle skills.




Figure 3. Fall 2023: Course sections system-wide.

WATER AND FOOD SECURITY PROJECT FUNDED BY THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

Italian Water and food Security Project activities kicked off. Community consultations have been completed, and 66 households were recruited from 5 atoll community settlements. Project activities are progressing as per the approved work plan.

- ◆ Served as a technical contributor for the upcoming Pacific Islands Regional Climate Assessment Report on 'Climate Change in the Federated States of Micronesia: Indicators and Impacts in Key Sectors.
- Submitted a paper for oral presentation during the upcoming Cycad 2023 - 12th International Conference on Cycad Biology in Angeles City, Philippines.
- Submitted a paper (in collaboration with other climate scientists) entitled "An Overview of Health Impacts of Climate Change in the Pacific Small Islands Developing States."



ISLET: INSTITUTE FOR STUDENT LEARNING AND EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING

- ISLET implemented a formative assessment tool for course review, for Spring 2023 17 did the self-review, a major improvement from last Fall 2022. Two instructors engaged in peer review. The office continues to work with faculty members-both full-time and parttime to make an online presence. The course review template being used to ensure that basic requirements (course syllabus, course materials, course objectives, etc.) for the course are on CANVAS (the LMS for COM-FSM).




Figure 4. Students who graduated from health-related programs within the last five years.

NOTE: Figures do not include the AA in the Health Career Opportunity Program.




Figure 5. Students who graduated from an education program within the last four years. 2023 figures only include those who graduated last spring 2023.



DEPARTMENT FOR INSTRUCTIONAL AFFAIRS

CHALLENGES AND RECOMMENDATIONS

CHALLENGES

- 1. IA continues to face limitations in course offerings due to the existing faculty shortages. Part of the shortage is attributed to delayed processes of hiring, unsuccessful attempts at getting a pool of applicants, loss of interest for those who have been recommended for the job due an extensively long wait period.
- Shortages putting burden on overloaded faculties and staff, emphasizing that from May 1 to 31, 2023, 8 employees have resigned from the IA department.
- Inconsistencies in reporting, either as a result of missing data or outdated data
- Existing challenge for compensating faculties with teaching overloads and grant coordination roles.
- Difficulty in hiring or retaining faculty due to unattractive rates

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Encourage all instructors, as academic advisors, to engage in intrusive advising (Both Full and Part-Time) before allowing them to teach online courses and face-to-face courses using Canvas.
- Put more emphasis on the AMS to help organize data-management, reporting, and decision-making.
- Focus more efforts on expediting the process of filling vacant positions.
- Work with campuses to propose future boot camps in areas of art, CTE, homemaking, etc.
