# NATIONAL CAMPUS AND CTEC TO HOST JOINT 82ND COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES AND GRADUATION CEREMONY

COLLEGE PREPARES TO HONOR SUMMER AND FALL 2025 GRADUATES UNDER THE THEME "EMPOWER. INNOVATE. THRIVE."

The National Campus and CTEC will jointly host the College's 82nd Commencement Exercises and Graduation Ceremony at 9:00 AM in the main gym of the FSM-China Friendship Sports Center. Graduates from Summer 2025 and Fall 2025 will celebrate their achievements under this year's theme, "Empower. Innovate. Thrive." The ceremony will feature Ms. Kathleen Veronica Tobin-Kostka, Senior Program Manager at the Australian Embassy in the FSM and a proud former student of the College of Micronesia—FSM, as the commencement speaker.


A graduation rehearsal is scheduled for December 17, 2025, at 9:00 AM in the practice court and main gym of the FSM-China Friendship Sports Center. The Office of the Registrar reports 212 potential program completers for Fall 2025, distributed as follows:

- National Campus 130 candidates;
- CTEC 35 candidates;
- Chuuk Campus 28. candidates;
- Kosrae Campus 9 candidates; and
- Yap Campus 10 candidates

Final eligibility will be confirmed on December 16, 2025, following the submission of final grades on December 15 and the completion of degree audits by the Office of the Registrar.

An additional 56 Summer 2025 completers will also be recognized during the ceremony. Their distribution includes: National Campus – 18; CTEC – 17; Chuuk Campus – 7; Kosrae Campus – 4; and Yap Campus – 10.

## **525 STUDENTS REGISTER EARLY FOR SPRING 2026**

EARLY REGISTRATION PERIOD OPENS UNTIL DECEMBER 12, 2025. REGULAR REGISTRATION FOR SPRING 2026 OPENS JANUARY 7-9, 2026.

Early registration for Spring 2026 opened on November 4, 2025, and will continue through December 12, 2025. Early registration is offered to give students the opportunity to plan their academic schedules ahead of time, ensuring they get the courses they need to stay on track for graduation. It also helps students manage their workload effectively, balance personal and work commitments, and secure priority access to popular or limited-capacity classes.

For the college, early registration provides valuable information for resource planning, including faculty assignments, classroom space, and course offerings, helping to improve overall scheduling efficiency and student success.

As of November 20, 2025, a total of 525 students have already registered, accounting for 6,770 credits, or 564 full-time equivalent (FTE) students. This means the college's early registration FTE is 7% higher than its headcount enrollment—a positive indicator that many students are enrolling in full course loads and progressing toward timely completion.



## COLLEGE AWARDS \$2.67 MILLION IN PELL GRANTS TO 782 STUDENTS FOR FALL 2025


As of November 18, 2025, 7:53 AM PONT, the college has awarded \$2,669,724.21 in Pell Grants to 782 students across all campuses for the Fall 2025 semester. The college's Financial Aid Office (FAO) continues to process Pell Grant awards for eligible students enrolled this semester, so this figure reflects the status at the time of reporting and will increase as additional awards are finalized.

## Campus-Based Federal Student Aid (FSA) Programs Federal Work Student (FWS)

From August 16 through November 12, 2025, 158 students enrolled in the Federal Work-Study program earned \$65,866.26 through on-campus work assignments. The distribution of students and earnings by campus is as follows:

- National Campus: 106 students | \$47,734.00
- CTEC: 25 students | \$7,877.13
- Chuuk Campus: 15 srudents | \$6,989.00
- Kosrae Campus: 5 students | \$1,638.50
- Yap Campus: 10 students | \$1,627.63


## Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)

Between August 16 and November 12, 2025, 17 students enrolled this Fall 2025 semester received a total of \$7,435.00 from the Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG). Of these, 16 students are from the National Campus and one student is from the Career and Technical Education Center (CTEC).

## Supporting Students: FSM National and State Scholarships, Fall 2025

From August 16 and November 12, 2025, 11 students received a total of \$9,514.31 in financial assistance through FSM National and State Scholarship programs for the Fall 2025 semester.

## Other Updates and Activities

- FAFSA Support. FAO provide personalized, in-person FAFSA support for students and parents by appointment and walk-in every Tuesday and Thursday.
- Fiscal Operations Report and Application for Federal Student Aid Programs (FISAP). On October 1, 2025, FAO completed and submitted to US ED the FISAP for award year 2024-2025. The FISAP is an annual report that provides data on the previous award year, requests funding for the upcoming year, and ensures the school's compliance with federal regulations for FWS and FSEOG programs.
- The college was awarded \$196,822.00 in FSEOG and \$174,331.00 in FWS for 2025-2026. However, a request to increase funding to \$300,000 for both campus-based FSA programs for the 2026-2027 award year was included in the October 1, 2025, FISAP.
- On October 28, 2025, US ED validated the college's October 1, 2025, FISAP. No further action was required, and the outcome of the 2026–2027 funding application will be released soon.

The College enrolled 1,704 students in Fall 2025 with 20,485 registered credits, slightly down from Fall 2024's 1,729 students (-25 students, -1.4%) and 21,422 credits (-937 credits, -4.4%).

## **Key Insights**

Overall, compared to Fall 2024, the college's total enrollment for Fall 2025 decreased slightly by -1.4% in headcount and -4.4% in credits, driven mainly by declines at CTEC and Yap. Campus-specific changes include:

■ National Campus saw a modest headcount increase of +1.8%, though credits slightly declined by -1.4%.

- Chuuk Campus experienced moderate growth with headcount up +6.9% and credits increasing +1.2%.
- Kosrae Campus recorded the largest growth, with headcount rising +30.7% and credits up +17.4%.
- CTEC and Yap Campuses experienced declines, with Yap showing the largest percentage drops: headcount -19.0% and credits -27.8%, while CTEC's headcount fell -14.6% and credits -9.9%.

## UPDATES FROM **COUNSELING AND TUTORING SERVICES**

#### ■ September 5, 2025. CTEC counselor attended the New Zealand Manaaki Scholarship presentation via Zoom with three interested students, where participants were briefed on scholarship requirements and heard from former recipients about adjusting to life away

- September 8-12, 2025. One counselor from the National Campus attended the mhGAP training, a WHO initiative to improve care for mental, neurological, and substance use disorders for non-specialized staff. Facilitated by WHO, UNICEF, FSM Department of Health and Social Affairs, and COM-FSM (Pat Ryan; counselors provided AV support), the training included Behavioral Health staff from all FSM states and reinforced ongoing weekly sessions with Patrick Ryan.
- September 24, 2025. Chuuk Campus counselor organized an Exam Study Strategy Workshop for 15 new students, providing tips to help them manage midterm and final exams. Pre- and post-workshop surveys showed that 53% of students learned significantly from the session, while 47% gained some knowledge but needed further learning.
- September 24-25, 2025. In recognition of World Suicide Prevention Day, the campus nurse and counselor at CTEC held a tabling event to raise awareness of risk factors, warning signs, ways to support someone in distress, and available on-campus resources; twenty-one students participated, and pre/ post assessments showed eleven students with unchanged scores, seven with improved scores, and three with no improvement.
- October 3, 2025. CTEC counselor met with students using the computer lab and provided last-minute midterm preparation tips, including active learning strategies, condensing key information, structured study sessions, and techniques for managing anxiety and maintaining well-being.
- October 6-10, 2025. The CTEC nurse and counselor held a series of World Mental Health Day activities, including a Fun Monday Karaoke break during midterms, where they highlighted the benefits of music for mental health and the risks of betelnut chewing. On October 8, a mindfulness and breathing session led by yoga instructor Valentina Permiakova taught participants stressreduction techniques. The October 10 Mental Health and Wellness Fair featured presentations by Dr. Epi, Public Health's Behavioral Health and Wellness staff, and Pat Ryan on the theme "Access to Services: Mental Health in Catastrophes and Emergencies." Twenty-six students attended, reporting increased awareness of positive coping strategies, the importance of support systems, and the need to seek help for themselves or others.
- October 15, 2025. CTEC counselor and campus nurse organized the Mental Health and Wellness Fair, which featured tabling by Public Health, Pohnpei State Health and Social Affairs, UNICEF, the campus Health Clinic, Counseling Office, and Student Body Association, offering students opportunities for relaxation, writing encouragement messages, and positive interactions, with a total of 203 encounters recorded.
- October 16 & 20, 2025. The lead counselor attended Suicide Prevention/Awareness training for the Senior Leadership and

Management Teams, presented by Patrick Rvan, Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Specialist.

- October 25, 2025. The Counseling Office held Career Awareness Day, featuring Ms. Adelina Wichep of the UN Volunteers Programme. She introduced the program, its objectives, services, and paid volunteer opportunities for local and international students, highlighting how volunteerism can support professional and personal growth. 25 students attended, and a post-event survey was conducted to evaluate the program's effectiveness.
- October 30, 2025. CTEC counselor joined Nanpei Memorial High School's Career Week with the late Student Life Coordinator Crystal Jackson-Joab, presenting to freshmen through seniors on steps toward future careers and strategies to maintain academic success for on-time college completion.
- November 4, 2025. Two National Campus counselors, along with the CTEC counselor. attended Day 1 of the Foundational Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) Training, organized by FSM Department of Health and Social Affairs and UNICEF's Child Protection Program. Conducted by Dr. Koen Sevenants, the training explored the inner world of children and adolescents affected by trauma and introduced creative counseling approaches using art, music, and movement.
- November 7 & 3, 2025. Two National Campus counselors, along with the CTEC counselor, attended I Support My Friends Facilitator's Training, developed by UNICEF, Save the Children, MHPSS Collaborative, and WHO. The training equips counselors to teach students how to support peers in distress. Facilitators included Andrea Glover (UNICEF), Sylvia Elias (UNICEF), and Dr. Koen Sevenants, Clinical Psychologist/Neurologist.
- November 9, 2025. CTEC counselor attended the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Pacific Region Conference as advisor to the college's chapter, where guest speakers Esther Atwell and Anna Maria Dennis discussed integrity in leadership, and participants connected with advisors and members from other regional chapters.
- November 12, 2025. Counselors from the National Campus attended Motivational Interviewing (MI) training with Dr. Koen Sevenants. By the end of the session, participants were able to explain MI philosophy and structure, apply OARS (Open-Ended Questions, Affirmations, Reflective Listening and Summarizing) skills, recognize and respond to "change talk," and better support others' motivation and autonomy.

## NATIONAL CAMPUS | HEALTH SERVICES **DISPENSARY RECORDS 771 VISITS BETWEEN AUGUST 16 TO NOVEMBER 13, 2024**

The data show that the most common reasons for visits to the health center are family planning services, including pregnancy testing and contraception, followed by routine health maintenance and prophylaxis, and general body aches or pains.



## Health Screening Activities

September 17-19, 2025

- HIV/AIDS Screening. 80 students and 4 staff members were tested; all were negative. The activity promoted awareness about HIV/AIDS, prevention, early testing, and reducing stigma.
- Leprosy (HD) Screening. 80 students and 4 staff members were tested; all were negative. The screening emphasized early detection, treatment, and prevention of complications.
- **TB Screening.** 63 students and 4 staff members were screened; one participant tested positive and is currently on treatment. The activity highlighted early detection, treatment, and prevention of TB transmission.


